In 2002, when we arrived on Bioko Island, Equatorial Guinea, malaria was a grim fact of life. Parents, children, entire communities were deeply affected. So with the expansion of our operations, we began our fight. Marathon and its partners led a coalition that included the government of Equatorial Guinea, academia, and non-governmental organizations. In two years, the \$12.8 million spraying and medical treatment program reduced malaria-transmitting mosquitoes by 95% and malaria in children by 44%.



It has been so effective, it is now being expanded to the country’s mainland. It’s been a life-changing experience — for me, and especially for the people of Bioko. Leading by doing. That’s Marathon.
